Christ-centered Marriage vs Christian Marriage

Many people believe that a marriage of two Christians automatically makes it a Christian-centered marriage. In 25 years of counseling we have experienced few Christ-centered marriages. It is sad to say that in the majority of marriages, Christ really is no where to be found. Author Gary Oliver contrasted the two:

Marriage of Two Christians	Christ-centered Marriage
Jesus is valued	Jesus is Lord
Problem focused	Growth focused
Self-focused	Other-focused
Conditional love	Unconditional love
Me oriented	Us oriented
I hear you	I listen to you
I want to be understood	I seek to understand
I want to be served	I want to serve
Pray sometimes	Pray always
Individual spirituality	Shared spirituality
Prayer is 'change my spouse'	Prayer is 'change me'

Honestly evaluate where Christ is in your marriage. Do you have a Christ-centered marriage? Or is it the marriage of two Christians? It begins with your answer to the question; 'Who is Jesus Christ?' Is He the Lord of your life? Is Christ's lordship evident in the way you treat your spouse and children? Yes, none of us are perfect, but there is a difference in the marriage of two people surrendered to Christ. They are not living for self, but seek to serve each other and others. Make *your* marriage a *Christ-centered* marriage.
