

Grace is the basis for the Christian faith. It is her grace to me that keeps our marriage growing in spite of my faux pas - my failings. Grace in marriage is the act of giving unconditional acceptance and love to our spouse, even when they have wronged us. Yes, poor behavior and sin must be addressed and there are consequences that may be reaped for that wrong behavior, but even in the addressing the behavior, grace must prevail.

Friends, the question is; do *you* give grace - to your spouse, your children, your friends - to anyone you come in contact with? Yes, it is not natural to give grace to others, but God's grace will empower you to extend His grace to those in your life.
